Satellite imagery and analysis have shown the construction of new military bases in Belarus, including one which could host a nuclear-capable ballistic missile, it has been reported. Belarus is Russia's closest ally, bordering NATO members Poland, Lithuania and Latvia, and has been used as a.

In Belarus, a large new military base is under construction, covering over 2 km<sup>2</sup>—equivalent to 280 football fields, according to the Schemes project citing Planet Labs satellite images. Belarus has built two new military bases and carried out a large-scale modernization of its network of military airfields near the borders of Ukraine and Poland. The Schemes journalists documented the development of Belarus' military infrastructure. The journalists analyzed dozens of satellite.

According to Radio Svoboda on September 10, construction began in June 2024 south of Minsk, near the village of Pavlivka. The site now spans more than 2 square kilometers—about the size of 280 football fields. Experts believe the complex may house Russia’s new “Oreshnik” ballistic missile system.
